

And The Bowl Rolls On



News From The Boardroom

The Board has continued to be very active in the past few months.

Following a meeting with both selection committees, a new document has been developed to support selectors and bowlers. These guidelines have been already emailed to members and will be available on the club website.

Coaches were invited to complete a survey to review the 2022 – 2023 season. These responses have been compiled and distributed to coaches and selectors.

Membership fees for the 2023 – 2024 season were considered and it was decided to return to the pre-COVID fees. The fees during COVID were heavily subsidised to account for the reduction in availability of Club facilities and possible COVID related hardships. As a result the Club ran at a loss during this time

which cannot be sustained ongoing.

Members are reminded that only affiliated members who have paid full fees are entitled to vote at the AGM

A new hot water system is being installed, changing over from the old gas unit to a new electricity unit.

In light of modern practice, no more plastic products will be purchased by the Club. The remaining plastics will however be used until run out. Members are to be reminded to bring their own drink bottles and fill/refill them from any of the 3 (chilled) water fountains provided.



Important New Bowls Laws

A new (4th) edition of the Laws of the Sport of Bowls came into effect April 1, 2023.

Here is a summary of new and changed laws that ALL bowlers need to know:

No bowl belonging to the players on the rink of play should be lifted, stopped, or displaced. This
includes preventing a bowl from falling into the ditch. This includes during Pennant. The penalty is
forfeiture of the game

When can a bowl be stopped legally?

(Law 42.2.11) A marker must stop a bowl from a neighbouring rink if the bowl could move a jack or bowl at rest.

(Law 37.6.1.2) Any player on a rink can stop a bowl if a bowl at rest is in danger of being moved by a bowl from a neighbouring rink.

(Law 37.6.1.1) Also allows a player to lift a bowl at rest to allow the bowl from the neighbouring rink to pass and then replace it. The preference is to stop a bowl from a neighbouring rink in preference to lifting, but both are permissible under the Laws of the Sport.

- A player should not be on the mat until the previous bowl has come to rest
- If a bowl has been played out of order by both players (Singles and teams) the order of play remains the same for that end
- There must be no further play in a knockout competition if it is impossible to win the game given the number of ends left

Interference

Old George Jones of bowling fame Was always quoting the "Laws of the Game" But one day he failed me an answer to give And I'll never forget it as long as I live An old jersey cow strolled onto the green And dropped the biggest dollop I've ever seen It was only a metre away from the jack His bowl got stuck in it and he wanted it back I said "You can't have it, don't be a fool ... If you touch that bowl you'll be breaking a rule" So he rushed to his bag and took out his book Turned over the pages and had a good look Then he said "There's nothing in here to say, that I can't get my bowl and continue to play" I said "Now listen George, and don't cause a commotion, Rule 37 says ... you can't interfere with a bowl that's in motion"

Mr X

Mr X was born in Palestine 4 months before it became the independent state of Israel. His mother came to Palestine from Latvia at the age of 2. His father was born in Palestine but his parents (Mr X's grandparents) came from Yemen. They left Yemen on foot until they caught a barge on the Red Sea arriving in Palestine as teenagers in 1882. In 1902 Baron Rothschild purchased a large portion of land for a new settlement and sought volunteers to work in and develop the area. 18 families including Mr X's grandparents took on the challenge. They were the only Mizrachi family, that is, the only family not from Europe. In time the settlement, which was named Kfar Tabor, grew to 45 families.

[The inspiration of the very wealthy Frenchman Baron Abraham Benjamin Edmond James de Rothschild (or more simply, Baron Edmond Rothschild) to develop settlements in Israel was the riots against Jews of Russia in 1881-1882. He was only 35 years old when he realised that the Jews who had settled in Palestine needed to be supported. He was nicknamed Hanadiv – The Known Benefactor. The first moshav (settlement) he supported was Rishon Letzion]

Mr X's father was a teacher in an high agricultural school only 4kms from their village. Sadly he passed away when Mr X was only 2 years old. He had an older sister only 4 years old. Life was difficult for their mother to support their family on her own. After a few years, his mother made the decision to make the move to a kibbutz (kibbutz Allonym) between Haifa and Nazareth in the north of Israel. Mr X remembers this as a happy time in his life. In those days on a kibbutz, children lived separately from their parents. They saw her in the afternoons and she would tuck them in at night. The rest of the time the children were so busy they didn't have the opportunity to miss their mother.

After finishing primary school Mr X attended a nautical boarding college to study nautical engineering. When he completed his studies he joined the Israeli Navy where he served for 3 years. He worked as an engineer on the frigates, medium sized warships. He later transferred to the base to teach about firefighting and damage control on the ships.

After completing his army service Mr X was employed by an Israeli refrigeration shipping

company transporting fruit, fish, meat and sometimes cars where he worked for 4 years as an engineer. He quickly advanced up the ranks. After only 3 years he became 1st engineer.

Because this was before containers, Mr X spent a lot of time in ports. Whilst in Australia on one occasion, he met an old friend who's girlfriend introduced him to a wonderful girl, Mrs X, who was to became his wife. They continued their relationship via mail for the next 12 months. Mrs X then came to Israel to visit family. The long and short of it is they were married in 1973, about to celebrate 50 years in June.

Once in Melbourne, Mr X had wished to open his own garage like other Israelis he knew. So he worked for a company which fixes cars and trucks to gain some experience in the trade. However, he found this work heavy and with little return. When an opportunity arose, he went to work for a shipping repair company. After 10 years the company closed down so he moved to another shipping company where he worked for 9 years after which he recognised cracks appearing in their financial status. This was an opportune time for Mr X and 10 of his workmates to go out on their own. They established a ship repair company called Waterside Engineering. Despite being told that they wouldn't succeed because they didn't have the skills to run a business, he remained as a partner for 27 years until he retired at the age of 67.

Mr X always enjoyed being active. For the last 35 years of his working life, he swam 5 times a week before starting work. Now he still swims twice a week

Mr X joined Armadale BC more than 8 years ago. He enjoys being part of the club and likes to bowl as often as he can. When he's not at the club he is very hands-on with his family. He and Mrs X have 2 children and 5 grandchildren.

Mr X is well known to members because he spends an enormous amount of time on maintenance at the club. His opinion is highly valued and nothing is too much trouble. Recently he was instrumental in the much appreciated upgrade of the bag shed.

He said: "When I wake up in the morning and my wife is sleeping on her left side, I play left- handed and if she is on her right side, then I play right- handed."


I then ask: "So, what if she is lying flat on her back?"

She thinks it over and in a few seconds, says "In that case let it read, Fred Brown died: bowls equipment for sale"







- 4. A bowl placed behind the head, positioned so that if the opposition trails the jack from its current position towards the back of the rink this bowl may become shot or reduce the number of shots that the opposition may have
- **6.** A bowl that remains in direct physical contact with the jack after being delivered
- **10.** A warm up end without scoring to enable players to test their bowls in the conditions before a game starts
- **11.** In a team of 3 or more the player who delivers his bowl last
- 12. The player who delivers his bowl first
- **14.** Used to indicate a bowl that has touched the jack as part of its initial delivery during an end
- **15.** A bowl delivered where the biased side of the bowl has been placed opposite to the desired position for a given delivery
- **17.** The bowl closest to the jack, often in relation to other bowls surrounding the head
- **18.** The action performed by a player to propel the bowl from the mat end of the rink to the head at the other end of the rink
- **20.** A bowl delivered with the maximum force that a player can exert the aim being to kill the end disturb the head or hit opposition bowls out of the head
- **22.** Playing a bowl so that it moves the jack from its current position to a position further sideways or backwards along the rink
- **23.** In a team of 3 or more the player who delivers his bowl immediately after the lead
- **24.** A bowl delivered finishes close to the jack, without the need to move or touch other bowls in the head
- **26.** The position a player adopts in preparation for delivering the bowl
- 28. The area surrounding a green usually identifiable as a shallow trench at the edges of the green
- **29.** A bowl delivered with more force than required to deliver it to a desired position on the rink
- **31.** The width of the bowl required to enable it to stop at a designated point within the rink
- **34.** For a right handed player delivering a bowl to the right hand side of the rink with the bias facing towards the centre line of the rink

- An official nominated by the competition organiser to provide adjudication of the rules of competition and to interpret the rules of bowls in the event of a dispute
- **2.** The way a player holds the bowl in preparation for delivery
- **3.** The small white ball that defines the target for all other bowls to be played towards
- 5. The natural curve built into a bowl
- **7.** A piece of material placed under a bowl to hold it in place on the green when measuring
- 8. The side of the rink that has the clearest path for a draw shot
- 9. Whose role it is to fill in the scorecards agree the match up of rinks between teams tally the total scores of all rinks at the end of a game and submit the results to the selectors
- **13.** A piece of equipment used by an umpire to measure a relative short distance between the jack and one or more bowls
- **15.** When a bowl is deflected during its progress after delivery from contacting a bowl or jack
- **16.** A marker placed on the bank to indicate the outside boundary of a rink
- **17.** A bowls surface made of man made materials, as compared to grass greens
- 18. A partially completed end that has to be replayed by reason of the jack going outside the rink or green boundaries or an umpire ruling that due to an action the head cannot be returned to its previous state
- **19.** A type of thick liquid compound applied to the surface of a bowl which is then rubbed into the surface using a hand or cloth or sleeve
- **21.** A bowl whose front edge, which is closest to the bowler on the mat, is level with the front edge of the jack
- **25.** If a bowl is delivered and finishes to the outer side of the intended target it is said to have been....
- 27. A type of grass (also known as Titdwarf a Bermuda grass hybrid) used for the construction of lawn bowls greens
- **30.** Deliver the bowl with sufficient weight to finish 1 yard past the objective
- **32.** A jack when delivered that stops at a point less than the minimum length allowed within the rules of competition
